CLC Canada Responds to Jesuit Ecology & Mission Commission – CLC Sent To the Frontiers

Questions:

1. What concrete actions is your community/apostolate currently taking to integrate care for creation into its life and work? What have been your successes and failures so far?

North America as a World Region (USA, Eng and Fr. Canada) is ready to look again at how the Spirit is drawing us together to serve *in common*. A short history with ecology was centred around water in 2007, when national crisis (USA, English and Fr. Canada) stopped the growth of this budding relationship. A teleconference will take place before Pentecost among the CLC-CVX North American leaders.

Experience of a discerned Regional Common Mission 2010 - approximately 25 lay communities

Presently CLC Central Region (Ontario) has entered into a long term relationship with Haitians (Hispanola) to help them rebuild their lives. There have been 3 insertion trips by lay members with JP Horrigan sj as guide and mentor. The mission has opened many avenues: in March 2014, particular to ecology, those mining practises by Canadian companies that are compromising the health of residents fatal birth defects, and animal fatality through water contamination not to mention the clear cutting of trees and open pit mining leaving what had been A1 agricultural soils destroyed. According to the DR Ministry of the Environment, Domingo Abrev shared there were no safe mining practises for Hispanola. Rather, economic growth though agriculture in the mountains is the means to go forward. The insertion team returned home with the PP Domingo uses to *strategically* inform local and in outlying area communities through 50 active members who advocate with them their rights in DR and in Haiti. Big money means devastation to land and persons now and for the future. *Mining companies sign contracts to make correction to environmental damage 75 years after the initial destruction!! Domingo is in opposition to the Gov't of DR who entertain the companies for profit (not the common good).* This collaboration has come through Mario Seranno sj of Santo Domingo who works with CVX and numerous organizations. In 2012 the insertion team learned there was an emerging interest by Jesuits near Port au Prince to irrigate and develop agricultural lands and to re-forest. At that time we hoped Development and Peace might see this project as one to invest in. Where it is at now I am unsure. A large Fe Y' Alegria school has recently been built in the remote area.

Lay Apostolic Visibility through Formation for Mission - 2014 - Mario Seranno sj of Santo Domingo is prepared to receive young adults (University students) for insertion experiences. The team recommends David Shulist sj of University of Sudbury engage this opportunity with students/ with CLC support . CVX French Canda may choose to invite the same interaction. We want to continue to develop relationships with CVX DR members. Antonio Milagros (CVX) volunteers in a Haitian Bate with dreams of a sewage treatment plant to serve the community there.






Develop long term relationships with CVX Young Adults/Jesuits in Haiti who will rebuild their country.

CLC - CVX 16th World Assembly Lebanon - July 2013



Fr. Pedro Walpole S.J. of South East Asia addressed the Assembly on the third Assembly priority, Ecology. His work has recently been in land management around issues of landslides. The central theme shared was of reconciliation: with creation, neighbour and God.

Fr. Pedro spoke of starting with a deep sense of gratitude for the gift of all life. He said sustainability is an exercise of the heart, going deeper than the facts and calling forth a genuine change in attitude, redirecting the carbon and poverty footprints of our generation. It is time for us to reconcile with Creation....to embrace poverty and beauty together through families where we speak what it is to be alive.

The converted heart will seek expression through: our institution and lifestyles, formation of young people and pastoral programs and governance of natural and mineral resources. The spiritual and social invitation above will move the ecology strategy and relationship with water, land, life and people.

We are encouraged to "clean up our act first", that is, to change within, continue to learn and be prepared to advocate. "You can only see into the future with faith, hearts of hope and hands of commitment." Fr. Pedro, we are ready to commit with the hearts and energy of a 25 year old, just like you asked!
